Backyard Livestock Permit

A permit is required by the City of Westminster pursuant to W.M.C. 6-7-12 (F) (2), 6-7-19, and 6-7-20. See table below for maximum numbers allowed based on lot size.

The undersigned is permitted to keep chickens, bees, and/or (1) potbellied pig under 95 pounds at the location listed above. Chickens, bees, and potbellied pigs are allowed in residentially zoned single-family detached home areas, absent specific zoning regulations or homeowners association (HOA) covenants that prohibit this activity.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION:

- SAFETY - It is important that your hive and/or coop enclosure is constructed securely to keep bees and chickens safe from predators such as owls, foxes, coyotes, and skunks. No action will be taken by the Colorado Department of Parks and Wildlife or by the City of Westminster due to wildlife conflicts with hives and/or coops or the killing of chickens by wildlife.
- Homeowners Associations (HOA) may restrict or prohibit the keeping of bees, chickens, and/or potbellied pigs through their covenants. If you are located in a covenant-controlled community you may not be allowed to own any of these animals. The applicant is responsible for complying with and abiding by their homeowners association restrictions (if any).
- Permits are non-transferable. If you move, the new resident must apply for a new permit.
