NEW BUSINESS

Presentation on snow plough salt economy device/system

Jennifer BP introduced Adam Goldie of Vaisala, who gave a presentation on the company's system for matching the amount of salt dispersed by snow ploughs with existing conditions. Salt is usually overapplied and wasted, and much of it ends up in stormwater systems. The Vaisala system measures air and surface temperatures and the friction coefficient of road surfaces. The resultant needed rate of salt dispersal is given in real time and can be actuated by the driver or, with a fully automatic system, varied without driver intervention. In tests, some 40% of material savings were achieved. Fort Collins has used the system and expanded its use to most of its fleet.

ACTION: Chris will write to the Public Works Director to advise him of this presentation and the Vaisala system.

Collaboration initiative letter to Front Range environmental/sustainability boards/ commissions

Maria and **Linda** presented the draft letter reaching out to other boards in Front Range communities proposing regional dialogue and collaboration.

ACTION: Bridger will use the letter to link to other communities and sustainability directors in Front Range cities, including Denver.

Westy Fest tabling topics/themes

The subject of Westy Fest themes was discussed. It was decided that themes could include a map showing EV charging station locations in the Westminster area and cards showing details of Westminster environmental/sustainable programs. Candy could also be provided for children.

ACTION: Bridger will develop graphics, lit. etc., for the booth.

ACTION: Chris will organize EAB staffing for the booth.

ACTION: Jennifer BP will supply the tent for the booth.

ACTION: Linda will supply a second table for the booth.

Environmental projects for schools

ACTION: Jennifer BP will create list of schools for project. **ACTION:** All should propose suitable subjects for project.
