# **Summary Statement:**

This report is for City Council information only and requires no action by City Council.

- The following report updates 2013 residential development activity per subdivision (please see attachment) and compares 2012 year-to-date totals with 2012 year-to-date totals.
- The table below shows an overall decrease in new residential construction for 2013 year-todate totals when compared to 2012 year-to-date totals (0 units in 2013 vs. 8 units in 2012).
- Residential development activity for the month of January 2013 versus January 2012 reflects a decrease in single-family detached (0 units in 2013 versus 8 units in 2012) and no change in single-family attached, multiple-family or senior housing (0 units in both years).
- In January 2013 the new City requirement for all residential housing units to include sprinkler systems became active. Therefore, many builders were rushing to get building permits before the end of 2012. This may be a factor in no permits being issued in January.

# **Summary Statement**

This report is for City Council information only and requires no action by City Council.

- This report provides the City Council with a summary of administratively approved projects processed between July and December 2012, since not all projects approved by the City require a public hearing and Planning Commission or City Council review.
- The Westminster Municipal Code subsections 11-5-9(B) and 11-5-10(B) require that a report be provided to the City Council that describes administratively approved Preliminary and Official Development Plans (PDPs and ODPs).
- Staff also reports some of this information as specific projects are approved throughout the year in the City's Weekly Edition. However, this report summarizes the development projects approved during July through December, 2012.

# **Background Information**

In addition to the municipal code requirements to report on administratively approved Preliminary Development Plans and Official Development Plans, the Planning Division tracks activity levels in various areas and for performance measures. A list of the projects that were administratively approved is outlined in the attached table.

Highlights of the second half 2012 Planning Division activities are summarized below:

- A total of 54 Official Development Plan amendments and waivers and Preliminary Development Plan amendments were approved administratively in the second half of 2012. This is a 15% increase over the first half of 2012 (54 v. 47).
- In the second half of 2012, staff held 119 informational meetings with customers interested in developing projects within the City. This is the same amount as during the first half of 2012.
- The number of customer inquiries between July and December 2012 was 5,655. This includes 643 walk-ins and 5,012 phone and e-mail requests. This is a 31% increase over the first half of 2012 (5,655 v. 4,311).
- For the second half of 2012, 202 business licenses were processed, which is a 14% increase over the first half of the year activity (202 v. 177).

The work the Planning Division performs supports all five of the City Council's goals of Financially Sustainable City Government Providing Exceptional Services; Safe and Secure Community; Strong, Balanced Local Economy; Vibrant Neighborhoods in One Livable Community; and Beautiful and Environmentally Sensitive City.

SUBJECT:	Noxious Weed Management Program in Open Space 2013

#### **Summary Statement**

This report is for City Council information only and requires no action by City Council.

The City of Westminster Open Space staff has developed an Integrated Pest Management Plan aimed at providing quality and effective noxious weed management. The following activities are planned for the Open Space Noxious Weed Management Program for 2013:

- **Mapping** Open Space has secured a Metro State University student to complete an internship during the months of January through April with his project goal of GIS mapping of noxious weeds within the City of Westminster Open Space sites.
- **Mowing** Open Space mowing activities will start up in April and continue through October and will be completed by both in-house tractor mowers and an in-house mowing crew.
- **Hand Cutting** Volunteer events will once again be scheduled in July/August that will be aimed at hand cutting and removing Common Teasel seed heads.
- **Spraying** (\$20,000) With approximately 3,000 acres of open space to manage for noxious weeds, staff will use a combination of outside contractors and in-house crews to spray open space sites.
- **Insect Release** (\$3,000) Staff will purchase specific insects that have proven to be effective in controlling specific noxious weed species.
- **Goat Grazing** (\$10,000) Staff is attempting to partner with local municipalities to bring in goats to graze open space sites for noxious weed control.
- **Russian-olive Removal** Volunteers will be used to remove Russian-olives from City of Westminster open space sites in riparian areas.

## **Background Information**

Noxious weeds are non-native invasive plants that displace desirable vegetation and degrade natural and agricultural lands. They threaten our drinking water supply, agricultural crops, pasture lands and native habitats. These plants have been transported accidentally from places as far away as Europe, Asia or Africa. Noxious weeds have an advantage in their new environment because the insects, diseases, and animals that would normally control them are not found here. The weeds are able to adapt to our varied climatic and environmental conditions.

With almost 3,000 acres of open space within the City of Westminster, the control of these noxious weeds is of vital importance. Left unchecked, noxious weeds have the potential to destroy the open space areas that the City of Westminster has preserved. Staff has taken an active role in the management of noxious weeds within the open space. An integrated management approach has been taken that involves prevention, mechanical, chemical, cultural, and biological practices. However, with limited manpower, staff will be looking at outside contractors to fulfill much of the management that is needed. The added manpower that a contractor has will make a dramatic impact on noxious weed control.

Staff considers noxious weed control its top priority. Like most other municipalities along the Front Range with open space programs, noxious weed control is our biggest challenge. It is a management task that is constant and growing. Staff will continue to look at all resources available to achieve the eradication and control that the State of Colorado requires. These resources may include the use of goats and/or specific insects, partnering with other agencies in noxious weed control projects, and utilizing special interest groups that are looking for community projects.

All funding needed for this program is budgeted in the POST operating accounts.

This program supports the City's Strategic Plan goal of "Beautiful and Environmentally Sensitive City."



## **Summary Statement**

This report is for City Council information only and requires no action by City Council.

- This report is an overview of the Business Services activities planned for 2013.
- This is a follow-up to dialogue that the City Council and staff had on August 27, 2012 regarding exploring some new activities and ideas for the Economic Development Office.

## **Background Information**

The City has a full program for existing businesses as noted on the attached "Business Services Program" sheet. To compliment these services, the city also has typically provided additional activities aimed at reaching out to and in some cases recognizing businesses for their contributions to the community or their achievements.

In August of 2012, city staff proposed to City Council the consideration of different activities that would be better suited at reaching a broader cross-section of the existing business community. For 2013, the new activities that are planned include:

- Business Legacy Awards This new quarterly event will recognize businesses at a City Council meeting and present awards to business owners. This set of events replaces the awards presented during the Business Appreciation Event. Businesses will be recognized for 25, 30, 35 etc. years of being in business. This awards presentation will also include a reception for the businesses being recognized prior to the City Council meeting as well as articles in the local paper. The first Business Legacy Award presentation will be to the 25 year celebrants on Monday, March 25, 2013.
- Westminster Tech Connects This quarterly networking event is aimed at reaching out to Westminster's technology oriented businesses, one the City's key industry sectors. These events are geared towards hearing from the attendees about what they have going on, and services that might help in their business efforts. It will also encourage communication and business development. A trial event was held in December 2012. The next event will be in March at the Hyland Hills Club House.
- Procurement Focus Groups This activity is in response to requests by many businesses to derive more business from the City of Westminster and other government entities as well as how to more effectively secure business contracts with larger businesses. Focus Groups will be

held first to better understand procurement concerns and actual services needed. Programming will then be developed as a result of the feedback received.

• Business Outreach Program – The Economic Development Office has partnered with the Fire Department for a new aspect of the Business Visitation Program. The Fire Department as part of their ongoing inspection program will be visiting with retail and service businesses that would not be normally visited during formal Retention Visits. In addition, to the Fire Department visits, City Council and Management Team members will continue retention visits with Primary Employers.

Other activities supported by the Economic Development Office that have direct benefit to Westminster businesses include:

- Adams County Connects: This event provides relevant business resources and services to our primary employers.
- Colorado Companies to Watch: This program recognizes Colorado based businesses for their achievements as well as growth and expansion.
- Jefferson County Industry Awards: This event recognizes Jefferson County businesses for significant achievements made over the previous year.
- Metro North Chamber of Commerce: The Chamber provides access to services and resources for businesses in the north metro area.
- North Metro Small Business Development Center: This is the place to go for business planning and advice. They are located inside Front Range Community College.

The Economic Development Office is committed to providing meaningful service to and gaining insight and feedback from all of the City's business community. The ultimate goal is to retain and help our businesses thrive in Westminster.

#### SMALL BUSINESS CAPITAL PROJECT GRANT:

The program provides financial assistance to encourage the growth of existing businesses in Westminster with 50 or fewer employees. The program is designed to compensate 10% (up to \$5,000) for one-time project related costs.

#### SMALL BUSINESS SCHOLARSHIP GRANT:

The program reimburses 50% of the cost of tuition, fees, and required materials, up to \$500 per business, per calendar year, after successful completion of courses. Applicants must be Westminster business owners/employers with 50 employees or less, and courses must be related to their field of business.

#### WESTMINSTER GREEN GUIDE:
