

### Victoria M. Bunsen Memorial Sculpture Garden

Victoria "Vicky" Bunsen worked tirelessly for more than 25 years on the City of Westminster's Staff as its staunchest advocate for historic preservation. Vicky began her career in the City Attorney's Office and later moved into the City's Community Development Department to devote herself full time to advancing the cause of historic preservation in the City.

Vicky was responsible for establishing the City's first urban renewal area and urban renewal project with the redevelopment of the Westminster Plaza Shopping Center at 72<sup>nd</sup> and Federal Boulevard. This project served a catalyst for significant redevelopment in Historic Westminster and a much broader commitment to historic preservation of the very roots of the City, including the Rodeo Supermarket, the Grange, and the Red and White building.

Art, music and historic preservation were Vicky's greatest passions. Vicky played a key role in the formation of the South Westminster Arts Group and the Historic Westminster Arts District. She could often be seen at the Westminster Grange playing her beloved fiddle with her old-time bluegrass band. Vicky's efforts were not limited to the original area of Westminster. Vicky went on to assure the preservation of The Shoenberg Farm and Dairy, the Semper Family Farm, the Mushroom Farm Water Tower and the Wesley Chapel Pioneer Cemetery.

It can be said that Vicky Bunsen was the City's "Mother of Historic Preservation." Without her devotion, passion and commitment to historic preservation much of the City's historic roots would be lost. Dedicating the Victoria Bunsen Memorial Sculpture Garden and the Fred Valente Humanitarian Park will serve as important and permanent reminders to the citizens of Westminster of the roots from which such a great City grew.

The Vicky Bunsen Sculpture Garden has two permanent sculptures on display and ten pad sites for the Sculpture on Loan program. The permanent sculpture installations include Lady Catrina by Victoria Patty and Patient Warrior by Christopher Romero. Eleven pad sites are available for the Sculpture on Loan program. This program displays sculptures for a limited period of time and brings approximately \$100,000 in valuable art for the enjoyment of those visiting the Vicky Bunsen Sculpture Garden. All selected artists receive a stipend for the period that their sculptures are on loan. The selected sculptures are identified through a national call for entries.

## About Victoria Patty

"Victoria's passion for making steel sculptures started after college in her mid-20's when she was hired as an industrial mechanic for the City of Boulder. Soon after being hired she attended welding classes at the local technical college. Learning how to weld opened up a door that would allow Victoria to express herself through steel. She would stay after work to make steel sculptures from the "boneyard" of leftover pump parts. "The pump parts were unique and fun to work with," Victoria remembers, "but I wanted a more delicate finish on my metal pieces. I needed something more feminine to add to them." In 1995, she signed up for a 3-week blacksmithing course taught by Frank Turley in Santa Fe, NM. She said "It brought me to another level with metal. I was drawn to the fluidity and softness of steel after it's heated in a 2000-degree gas forge." There she learned how to make her own tools through blacksmithing practices such as forge welding and tempering as well as the delicate scrolls that "finish" her pieces.

As a sculptor working with steel, her goal is to make this rigid substance appear soft and supple, fluid and dynamic. To enable expressions of textures and curves that invite the touch of a hand. Her techniques are a fusion of both the old world and the new world of metalsmithing. She continues her research and testing of the steel's tolerance to heat and manipulation.

# About Bobbi Rubingh

"Outdoor art has always appealed to me, especially repurposed metal sculptures. Many of my pieces are made with metal, wood and stone. ### From the Artist about "Celebration"

"During the pandemic, I needed to create using the materials I had on hand. I had many steel rods and made some small pieces that captured movement, but I wanted something large, colorful and eye catching. Celebration! is the crown jewel of the "Blowin' in the Wind" series. This piece sways in the slightest breeze yet withstands strong wind gusts.

## About Gerry Newcomb

"I have begun working on a new series of forms relating to the idea of a wave, flow of water, or air. By making these vertical, I am referencing a larger image by allowing the eye to extrapolate the curves into a larger context from the base to past the highest point. By marrying the steel with the glass, I'm using it in a more plastic way so it seems to become a fluid material and the two materials work closely together. I want the glass to look as 'structural' as the steel. The relief detailing on the glass lead to the idea of the biologic diversity in the water column."

### About Reven Swanson

"Reven Marie Swanson is an accomplished sculptor installing works throughout the Rocky Mountain region and the West. She installs many temporary outdoor installations leased by city municipalities. She works closely with city officials and installation crews successfully exhibiting a dozen works each year. Recent commissions in Colorado include Trust for Public Lands, the National Endowment for the Arts, and the Museum of Outdoor Arts. Ms. Swanson's artwork is about change, movement, balance and growth. Through the artworks, Ms. Swanson seeks to explore modern culture and its relationship with the natural world. The works are often suspended or mounted above ground to imply flight, movement, and transitional experiences of growth."

# From the Artist about "Space Moon"

"Space Moon" is a part of the sculptor's "Dancing Moon" series. It is an exploration of implied kinetics. The steel shapes intertwined looks as though it may roll off down the street. The colors, finished in highly durable powder coat, dance with a striking energy. It appears to be an electric light to the viewer's eye. The sculpture embodies the essence of "implied" kinetics. The form is to reflect life as a celebration in a whimsical dance with the viewer and nature. "Space Moon" is fabricated from 1/4"-plate mild steel. It has been powder coated in a two-part process. There are bench-like seats providing an interactive experience and potential selfie opportunities."

The form itself spins when provoked, adding to the excitement and wonder. Versions of "Icosahedron" are currently installed in 12 states across the US.

## About Sandy Friedman

"The environment of Colorado and the Southwest significantly influences my work. I draw from the energy of the mountains, sky, weather, plains, grasslands, rivers, wetlands and our urban environments. My sculptures represent the energy found in totems and the interaction of the positive and negative spaces created by the sculpture's shapes. These represent moments in time depicted in a static state. My sculpture is positive and reaches out to folks to encourage exploration of thoughts, positive affirmations and general well-being.

### From the Artist about "Fan Fare II"

"The environment of Colorado and the Southwest significantly influences my work. "Fanfare II" depicts the energy found in totems and the interaction of the positive and negative spaces created by the sculpture's shapes and colors. These represent a moment in time depicted in a static state. "Fanfare II" heralds the energy of life reaching out in al directions to celebrate the joys of our environments, family, friends and life itself.

#### About Hi-Fire Salt

Hi-fired salt ware was discovered in Germany as far back as the 16th Century. The kilns and potteries that were producing utilitarian ware were primarily wood fired. This firing process required a lot of wood. When the forests began to recede from usage it became increasingly more difficult and expensive to obtain the wood necessary for firing. A creative potter realized that there was a lot of driftwood that had accumulated along the shorelines and often it was aged, dried and perfectly cured for wood-fired kiln usage. Potters began using this wood. The side benefit was that it created an attractive pitting that is now termed orange peel on the surface of the pots. Chemically, the sea salt fumes were reacting with the silica sand in the clay body. The higher temperature stoneware resulting from this fuming process was found to be much more impervious and durable to foods and chemicals.

Many folks familiar with old German beer steins, will notice a similar orange peel effect.

### About Annette Coleman

"My inspiration are earth's elements; water, fire, wind, and erosion abstracted. The esthetic of earth's landforms, rock formations, clouds and how the weather and time has altered our environment are key elements. Even my metal stands have patina from rain and snow. The juxtaposition of my shinny vibrant stainless steel and stained-glass insets on a matt metal stand is an interesting contrast. Even when the landscape becomes grey and subdued my sculptures become bright notes of sparking reflections often with beautiful colorful mosaics.

Mosaics last for decades with minimal upkeep think Pompeii with the colors of today.

I enjoy the process of public art and invite, embrace, and ask for input from the public that the art serves. This includes the art commission, staff, and the public as the project progresses, often having public comment on ongoing drawings and presentation materials.

The civic space and how it is used by the public is also one of my focuses."

# From the Artist about "Apollo's Journey"

"Named after Apollo, the Greek deity associated with music, dance and healing among other attributes. This totem is in honor of all the healing powers of the universe, past and present and a tribute to the arts and their healing attributes. Created on recycled satellite dishes, this stained glass mosaic sings a song of hope."
